Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

1. Why should I participate in a Virtual Learning Community (VLC)?

Learn from and with colleagues who share a common vision about teaching and learning. Online discussions offer the opportunity to make personal connections, explore areas of interest, and grow in your professional practice. Learning will be embedded in the daily teaching and learning that takes place in your classroom. The community will model effective 21st century tools and strategies. By design, VLCs are flexible, save time, improve your efficiency, and give you quick access to resources and solutions.

2. When would I participate?

The benefit of a VLC is that it provides just-in-time support. The community will be available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. You will be able to access the discussion platform whenever is most convenient. Live webinars will also be offered on a monthly basis at a set date and time. Participate as you are able and interested. Archived recordings will be available for those who cannot participate live.

3. Who else will be part of the community?

Teachers from other Priority Schools will comprise your community. You will be joined by trained, virtual coaches whose job is to support your learning. At all times, you will be able to review the backgrounds of your community’s members.

4. Will my principal or parents be able to read what I share online?

The VLC is a private, online space. Only other members of the community will be able to access your posts. At no time will administrators from your school or district (or parents or anyone else) be allowed access—unless access has been previously arranged and agreed upon by all VLC members (that includes you).

5. What will be discussed in the VLC?

You will help select the topics of focus for your online community. We will offer options for overall content, but your interests and needs—along with those of your colleagues—will drive the day-to-day discussions.

6. Who are the virtual coaches?

Accomplished teachers from across the country participated in a series of training webinars over the summer to become better acquainted with facilitating VLCs. The mentors bring with them a wealth of knowledge and experience from a range of schools settings—from small rural to large urban schools. Many have achieved National Board Certification or served

as coaches and mentors in their districts. Most important, they bring an excitement and eagerness to guide you in your professional growth.
